NEW AT THE LDS BRANCH LIBRARY

Genealogical Handbook of German Research. Larry Jensen. <u>Volume 1</u> is a guide to German research. It contains many sources for successful research in Germany. Indexed. <u>Volume 2</u> includes: finding the place of origin, using the Meyers Gazetteer, locating places on maps, locating vital records, determining and locating locality records, understanding cultural and historical background, process of verification, basic research procedures, and Patronymical naming practices.

Locating Your Revolutionary War Ancestor, A Guide To Military Records, by James and Lila Neagles. This book provides what materials are available for ancestors who fought in the American Revolution and how to actually find an official record of their military service.

The Compass, Volume 1, by Lawrence Bangerier. An aid to research of immigrants to America, it includes a directory of sources in which is found name of ship, type of ship, ship's ports, registration date of manifest, and source from which it was taken.

Passenger & Immigration Lists Index, edited by P. William Filby and Mary K. Meyer. 1982, 1983, 1984, and 1985 supplements. This basic index and supplements bring together information about 1,100,000 immigrants and millions of relatives who accompanied them. Details given are: name in full (and age) of primary immigrant, names and ages of accompanying dependents or relatives, date and place of arrival, source wherein the record can be found.
