NEWS ITEM ## from the MISSOULIAN, Wednesday, Jan. 2, 1991 -- "SOME U.S. HISTORY DIES IN COMPUTER REVOLUTION" This article by Michael J. Sniffen of the Associated Press contained this quote from Rep. Bob Wise, D-W.Va. "The ability to read our nation's historical records is threatened by the complexity of modern computers. Already the National Archives has computer records that can the be read." Many records from the past 30 years are available only on computer tape that is intelligible only by computer systems that are obsolete or have been discarded. Some of the tapes have also already decomposed or will do so if run through the old machines that can read them. Of particular importance to genealogists is the fact that these records include the 1960 Census Data, and the "most extensive record of Americans who served in World War II" which "exists exists only on 1600 reels of microfilm of computer punch cards." There is no machine currently availably which can read an re-interpret this material! It is unknown how many other records currently exist in only this condition. Kenneth Thibodeau, the director of electronic records for the National Archives said that while Congress has just increased his staff from 20 to 28, it would take them 25 years to process all the materials that are owed them by every agency from the last 20 years.

FAMILY SEARCH UPDATE - from a report by Mary Lynn Spijkerman Packer

1 - A new and updated version of the Ancestral File part of the new CD disk computerized search will be out soon. 2 - The Social Security Death Index has been added to the Family Search programs and is now available at the Missoula Family History Library. All deaths reported to Social Security from 1936-1962 (1.5 million names) and all deaths reported to Social Security from 1962-1988 (38 million names) are on 4 CD disks. These can be searched and the information can also be downloaded to your floppy disk. It is very easy to use and can be very helpful in locating that missing relative who was living after 1936 and died before 1988. On entering your surname using either exact or similar spelling, the first screen you see will be a list of persons of that name (with the entered person highlighted) showing the birth year, state where Social Security number was first issued, death year, and state of residence at death. If you continue with the search the next screen will give an exact birth date, the Social Security number, month and year of death and state. If a zip code is included in the locality information for the death, the next screen will show the localities for that zip code and where the death benefit was paid if at all. Continuing the search will show a list of states and, after selecting the one you need, you will see the current address of where to write for birth and death records and the current cost. Further information is available directly from the Social Security Administration under the Freedom of Information Act and a sample letter is included inn the bulletin at the Family History Library. This request may return the names of tha parents of the deceased and costs \$7.00 if the Social-Security number is included with the request.
