As described in the last newsletter, the Scottish Parish Register Indexes on microfiche are in the most used books on microfiche cabinet. There are four indexes for each Scottish Parish — a surname and a given name index for both births and deaths. These are only from the registers of the official Scottish Presbyterian Church and users should first carefully read the instruction on the first fiche card. A special not for using these — they were filed just as they were when they arrived and the four indexes are intersperced, not filed alphabetically by county, and the

fiche cards are not always in numerical order! Hopefully, these will soon be re-filed in a better way.

## IN THE MAIL

National Genealogical Society Newsletter Vol.17,No.6, Nov.-Dec. 1991. The 1992 Conference in the States will be held 29 April- 2 May 1992 in Jacksonville, FL. They will be celebrating the Columbus Quincentenary with a series of lectures on methodology in ethnic family history and genealogy with an emphasis on Spanish-Americans, and mark the 188th anniversary of Ellis Island with a slide-lecture program on its history and operation. BIG HORN COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY NEWSLETTER, Dec 1991. In interesting source of maiden names in deeds and mortgages was described. For deeds, look in the lower left hand corner for two to four signatures of witnesses. The first is always from the husband's side, the second from the wife's which is to protect her 1/3 dower right. This second signature should be a good clue to the wife's maiden name. With mortgages in the 1808's and before, it was traditional for the wife's father to cover the note or carry the mortgage as part of the wife's dower. Up to 70% of the time, the person to whom the couple are making the payments to will be the wife's father. This is true in Canada as well as America, so check the local property records.

FADED GENES, Lewis & Clark County Genealogical Society, Helena, MT, Dec. 1991. Have available Cemetery Records Books from Forestvale and Resurrection Cemeteries (\$30.00 0), and Sacred Heart Church and Sunset Memorial Cemetery of Helena (\$25.00 0). This issue has the surname index to vol. 8.

THE 1920 FEDERAL POPULATION CENSUS, a catalogue from the National Archives, gives a few research hints and information on finding the enumeration district for a large city. For the 1920 Soundex, they suggest that, if your surname has a prefix such as Van, Von, DE, Di, or LE, you should code it both with and without the prefix because it might be listed under either code. However, Mc and Mac are not considered prefixes!

TV GENEALOGY The tape that was ordered from the FAMILY HISTORIAN cable TV series has arrived. The tape that Paulette ordered was "Locating Immigrant Ancestors". A guest for this show is Thomas A. Peters, president of the Genealogy Club of the NJ Historical Society. Mr. Peters brings some interesting U.S. documents that he used to trace his ancestors across the ocean. The tape could be very useful for the beginning genealogist. It will be available for check-out from the Missoula City Library for 24 hr. loan.
