GenColl R 929.2097 MANN This book traces the Devores, De Vores, Devours families who in the US were found buying ground on what was to become Manhattan Island, and having farms in Haarlem and on Long Island.

THE GENEALOGIST'S COMPANION AND SOURCEBOOK by Emily Anne Croom. GenColl R 929.1072 CROOM This is a follow-up to the author's highly regarded UNPUZZLING YOUR PAST: A BASIC GUIDE TO GENÉALOGY, a "beyondthe-basics, hands-on guide to unpuzzling your past. The twelve chapters include titles as Cluster Genealogy, Federal and State Census Records, County and Courthouse Records, Special Collections, Libraries, African-American and NAtive American Genealogy, Immigration and Naturalization and Long-Distance Genealogy. Appendices refer to archives, and publishers, and include sample census forms.

SURNAME SCAM?

Probably most of you are familiar with the "Surname" books coming out of Bath, Ohio from a company (name changes periodically) that has published books with all the "Scotts" or other surname in the world listed (mostly looks like a one-surname telephone directory). They publish books which list a great many people with the same surname, but they are of limited value to a researcher. Now it looks like the company is branching out into the bogus reunion business. The current advertisement is for a "Scott" family reunion to be held in Scotland (there may be others). The letter bears a return address in Bath, Ohio, with the sender's surname (bogus address) the same as the recipient's (Scott). This event, like the surname lists is very likely to be much less than you would expect. There is also another twist to the "Surname" books floating around - "Your Family Since the Civil War" which may be from the same operation. Be very wary of any offers that sound like the above!


