## BITS AND BYTES



**COMPUTER SHOPPING ?** At the April meeting, Gordon Lemon, from Connecting Point - 4G Computers was gracious enough to replace Leslie Opsahl who could not make it to our meeting that night. Gordon showed us the basic components of a good computer system and had two really good suggestions. First, if you have trouble reading the small print on the computer monitor, try getting a 15" monitor instead of the usual 12" monitor. The 15" monitor has 30% more viewing space and so gives you bigger print. Second, make sure that you get a surge suppressor and be certain that it has a lifetime warranty. Some of the older type surge suppressors can fail after 2-3 "hits" and the next "hit" will wipe out your computer system. If you have one of the older type, replace it!

## BIG SKY TELEGRAPH

Frank Odasz, who is the director of Big Sky Telegraph or BST for short, gave the opening talk at the MSGS seminar last weekend in Dillon and we had an opportunity to sample the Internet via BST in the afternoon class. BST has both a "free access" and a "fee access". The "free access" allows access via Internet and Dialup to most of their resources, conferences, online lessons, and highest value files. The "fee access" gives you personalized Internet email accounts and access to full Internet capabilities. New subscribers pay \$120 per year for a full Internet connection and all services with no other hourly

fee. There is, however, your long distance phone fee if you are not in Dillon.

## MONTANA ONLINE

**Montana Online** is a local, Missoula connection to the Internet. You pay a \$20 per month flat fee and get unlimited connect time with no long distance charges. You can contact them via voice at 721-4952, modem at 721-9100, and get a demo from 721-3155. When I dialed in for the demo I got the following description of their services:

"Internet Connect Service (ICS) of Montana is a public access Internet provider based in Missoula MT. We offer dialup, telnet, and SLIP connections to individuals & groups. All major services such as email, telnet, list servers, USENET newsgroups, FTP sites, etc. can be accessed using a simple, user-friendly menu system.

This free demo will allow you access to several services which will give you a good 'taste' of the Internet. You will be disconnected after 10 minutes of usage. Please be considerate of other people who are using this demo service; if you want to reconnect, wait a few minutes first. If you want a regular Internet subscription, please give us a call at (406) 721-4952 (voice)."

## FotoBase for Families

This is an ad for a new "point-n-click" method to store, annotate, and display family photos. The PhotoBase computer program that displays the linked photos is free when you send a gdc.com file and your photos to the Persona Company for scanning. They charge a \$5.00 fee plus \$2.75 per photo scanned. The scanned photos are linked according to the identifications sent with the gdc.com file. All photos are stored in standard bitmap form so that they can be used in other applications as well. (Like Family Tree Maker.) The PhotoBase may be freely distributed to others. This sounds like a neat product, but I would make copies of the photos that I wanted scanned and not send any original photos. System recommendations for this program include a 486DX-66Mhz processor with 8 MB of RAM, windows 3.1, dos 6.2, and a 600 DPI printer. We have several fliers for this service if anyone is interested.

## WMGS NEW BOOK PURCHASES AT THE MSGS SEMINAR

**Assets Unknown** - by David W. Folsom, Two Dot Press, 1994. David Folsom was the luncheon speaker at the conference. His talk was an outline of how he, and the many people he has helped at no charge, have found many financial assets that they never knew existed. While this book is a great guide to those looking for hidden assets, it is also a great guide for genealogists. It includes information on obtaining data from vital records (all "where to write and cost info"), counties (includes addresses of all U.S. county courthouses), state and federal tax records, credit reports, motor vehicle departments, professional licenses, corporate records, credit card reports, archives, passports, and accident reports. Sample letters to the various agencies mentioned are also included. There is also a section on state government general information, and pages of addresses for areas of possible hidden assets including retirement funds, insurance companies, and state banking and credit union administrations.

**French and Canadian Family Research** - by J. Konrad, Ye Olde Genealogy Shoppe, P.O. Box 39128, Indianapolis IN 46239, rev. 1993. Chapters include The Immigration, The History of the Land, Begin by Researching Your French-Canadian and French Ancestors in the United States, Ancestor Hunting in French Canada, and Ancestor Hunting in France. There are maps, charts, address lists for the Civil and National Archives in Canada and the Department Archives in France as well as French genealogical societies, a list of French terms and equivalents, and sample letters in French to both civil and religious sources in France.

**Cherokee Connections** - by Myra Vanderpool Gormley, C.G., Family Historian Books, 207 S. 119th St., Tacoma WA 98444. This book contains maps of Cherokee towns and settlements, and has chapters on Family Legends, A Mini-History, Sources and Records, Select Bibliography, Repositories, Cherokee Publication Sources, and an Index.

**American Naturalization Processes And Procedures** - by John J. Newman, Family History Section, Indiana Historical Society, 1985. This is an excellent source for determining what naturalization laws were in effect at the time that your ancestors were naturalized, as well as some of the special circumstances under which naturalization could be obtained (and citizenship lost.) The bibliographic essay includes information on other sources written about naturalization, general publications on the use of naturalization records by the researcher, and an incomplete but representative list showing where naturalization records or information about citizenship records may be found. The back of the book contains samples of the different types of Declaration of Intention and Naturalization Petitions that have been used over the years, showing what information you can expect to find in each time period.

**1920 Custer County Montana Census Index** - from the Yellowstone Genealogical Society.


