VITAL RECORDS FIND: During the move of the Vital Records Dept. a complete set of statewide death records, 1907-1966, as well as marriages and divorces, 1943-1968 on microfiche was discovered and is now available for viewing and searching at the Montana Historical Society Library. The marriages and divorces are also available on microfilm. The records are arranged alphabetically by year so searching should be fairly easy.

#### President's Message

When was the last time that you read the stated objectives in your local genealogical society's bylaws or the objectives of the state society for that matter? Take them out, dust them off, read them, and then ask yourself, "How are we doing? Is there more that we could or should be doing?" Being active in a genealogical society involves more than just trying to further your own personal research. Most societies include the following goals among their lists of objectives:

Promoting historical/genealogical research

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Locating, preserving, and indexing public and private historical/genealogical records Promoting the availability of these records and indexes to the public.

I suspect that sometimes we need to remind ourselves that we are not just trying to achieve the above goals for ourselves. We should be including the public at large in our vision, especially our youth. How are we doing? Most of us have published some indexes and other helpful items. Some of our local societies are fortunate enough to have holdings of records, indexes, and other resources, but there is so much more that we could be doing.

Focus on the first and third items above with emphasis on the words "promoting" and "public." We must do more than gather and produce resources and then sit back and expect people to come. Most of the general public does not know that we exist or what we have to offer. We need to communicate regularly with others, especially our historical societies and museum directors, libraries, LDS family history centers, and schools. We need to know what resources these groups have, and we need to make sure that they know what resources we have.

Many teachers are now trying to help their students see how their own family and community fit into the larger historical picture. They are finding that by doing this, the youth are more readily embracing history and developing a sense of belonging in their communities. Yes, it takes a village to raise a child, but if we do not include the history of the child's family and the village in the raising, we will lose him. This is what the Montana Heritage Project is all about. Have you heard of it? Find out about it, and see if you can help your schools become involved. Our MSGS 1st vice president, Paulette Parpart, is currently working with several people-teachers and librarians--to develope a family history unit for children in elementary schools. Hopefully in the future we can help schools develope such a unit for youth in middle and high schools too. Visit your local schools and talk to your history teachers. Although they teach some local and state history, often they are not natives of your particular area. They have a tremendous need to know what local resources are available. Don't just give them a list of the resources you have, but let them know about everything that is available in the area--including those wonderful people who are walking local history books.

The effort to make and keep records available to the public is neverending. We are still working to keep the state vital records open and available to researchers, but there is more to be done. There is an index of the 1910 census for Missoula County that is not available to the public because of a disagreement between two parties--the indexer and the University of Montana. Look around. Are there useful resources in your area that are in danger of becoming unavailable for use or even destroyed? Let us know about it. We all need to know about these problems and try to work for a solution. it Thompson
