NEW FILM ORDER POLICY AND PRICING

The Family History Library in Salt Lake City has instituted a new film order policy and pricing effective March 1st 1997. The new price for all film orders / renewals is now \$3.25. Two re-newal will be allowed but after the second re-newal a film will stay in the library indefinitely. (It will effectively cost \$9.75 to get a film indefinitely.) All loans will be for 60 days from the date of shipment / re-newal until the film is received back in Salt Lake City. There will no longer be any 6 month loans. Films must be received back in Salt Lake City by the 60 day limit or they will be automatically renewed and the FHL will be billed. At our librarians meeting last Saturday it was decided that new films would be put out with a return date 7 weeks (49 days) from the date they are put out. This should allow sufficient time for shipping from and to Salt Lake City to get the films back within 60 days of shipment. Re-newals will get a full 60 days from the return date originally marked on the box... This new automatic re-newal policy will likely also affect current 6 month loan films in the library. They must be returned earlier to avoid the automatic re-newal billing so you may see their return dates decreased by a week to allow for shipping back. The new 60 day policy will also affect the already tight film storage space. (Some new shelving is planned.) Since films can now stay in the library for twice as long, and indefinites are again allowed, a system of marking the films "DONE" will be instituted so that some films can be returned before the 60 day period freeing up shelf space. You will see a modified label on your film boxes with a place for you to initial the label when you are finished with the film and it is O.K. to return it to Salt Lake City. Also mark 'DONE' across the label so that Carol will easily spot it when she does the film returns. All of the librarians thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

INDEXING

The group indexing of the MISSOULIAN is continuing, (and growing!), on Tuesdays at 1:00 PM in the Montana Room of the Missoula Public Library. We had 5 people indexing last Tuesday! Once you've been trained on what to do, any time that the library is open, it's OK to come on in and index! We're in 1929 at the present and averaging about 1 month of newspaper /month /person.

BITS AND BYTES Great sites for maps:

This site features an INTERACTIVE ATLAS which allows you to find and view maps on a national, regional,

city or street level. Click on 'go to map', fill in the city and country and wait a few seconds for your map to appear! They come with highway numbers and you can even get driving directions, locations of lodging, services, etc!

This site is the Geographic Names Information System Query Page of the U.S. Geological Survey. You get a fill in the blanks query page that allows you to search for certain geographic 'feature types' located in a particular state/county in the U.S. If you enter a state and a county with 'cemetery' as the feature type, you are returned a listing of all cemeteries shown on the U.S. Geological Survey map for that county. The list contains the name of the cemetery, its latitude and longitude and the name (township)of the USGS 7.5' map showing that cemetery. There is a fairly long list of accepted feature types that you can enter. Included are church, civil, school, river, stream, etc. When I entered Nassau County, NY I got back a list of 31 cemeteries. Not every church or cemetery will turn up but its a good start.

Summary of two recent society programs, "How We Do Our Family Reunions" and "Hoe To Do Family Histories", both by Mitzie Lund. Also "The Heritage Of Our Christmas Traditions" by Mary Criswell, and "Formulas For A Good Letter".

PRAIRIE TUMBLEWEED, Powder River Genealogical Soc., P.O. Box 394, Broadus, MT 59317, Vol.1, No.1, Nov. 1996. This is the first newsletter from a new society. They are doing a SURNAME INDEX of the local newspapers that are on microfilm at the local library, and indexing the Powder River County cemeteries. See article "A Spelling Lesson" for some good tips when looking for foreign names. The idea of having someone who speaks the language of the foreign born person you are researching pronounce the name that you are interested in is a great help in figuring out possible spelling variations.

TREASURE STATE LINES, Great Falls Genealogy Society, Paris Gibson Square, 1400 1st Ave. North, Great Falls, MT 59401, Vol.22, No.9, 1997. "Turn of the Century Coal Miners" has a list of names many of which represent Slovenian, Croatian, Serbian and Montenegrin families who came from Europe shortly after the turn of the centurn and settles in the south central part of Montana. The list were originally

published in the Spring 1990 and Summer 1994 issues of Montana Magazine of Western History. These magazines and a copy of the Master Index for the Oral Histories are available at the Great Falls Genealogy Society library. This issue also has the "Birth Register -1903", and the "Hereford Association - 1886" (a cattle breeders association first organized I n 1881).

TALES & TRAILS, Columbia Gorge Genealogical Society, % The Dalles Public Library, 722 Court St., The Dalles, OR 97058-2270, Vol. 11, No. 3. They have a list of cemeteries from the Portland, OR and Vancouver, WA areas. June events at the Dalles include a Leland Meitzler conference on June 14th and their Family History Fair, "Preserving Our Heritage", on Saturday, June 21st at the Portland State Ballroom.

GENEALOGY BULLETIN, No. 37, Jan.-Feb. 1997. See "A Review of Published Indexes to the U.S. Federal Censuses, Part I: 1790-1840; "Scottish Church Records, "3000 Queries", and AGLL's Clearance sale and New Books listings.

GENEALOGICAL HELPER Jan/Feb 1997: Here is the "1997 Directory of Locality Periodicals" - the updated list of publications pertaining to particular areas or locations; "Land Record" - says that "the older the records, the more genealogical data they contain" and

that "statements regarding relationship (other than husband and wife) are found in about 10% of early American deeds". Also take a look at "A Genealogical Journey" which says that "genealogy studies of family members can be enhanced by revealing their personalities through handwriting analysis".
