When a Family History Center orders microfilms from the Salt Lake Distribution Center, the Distribution Center checks to see if the films are available in its circulating collection. If the films are available, they are shipped to the Family History Center. If the film is not in the circulating collection and the ordering system indicates that another Family History Center has the film on loan, the Distribution Center will wait two weeks to see if the film is returned. If the film is not returned, an order is sent to the Granite Mountain Records Vault for a new copy.

The Family History Library has released a number of new software products on CD-ROM. In order to use these disks your computer must be Pentium speed and run at least Windows 95.

- 1. Family History SourceGuide™ an automated research guide, which contains all of the Research Guides, #50176, \$20.
- 2. The 1851 British Census an index to census records of Devon, Norfolk, and Warwick Co., #50096, \$5.
- 3. The Australian Vital Records Index (1788-1905) an index to records from New South Wales, Tasmania, Victoria, and Western Australia, #50095, \$20.
- 4. The North American Vital Records Index lists nearly five million names taken from church and civil records and from other collections in the United States and Canada. The items in this seven-CD set focus on marriage records (6 discs) and also list some births and christenings (1 disc). The North American records indexed date from 1620 to1888. The index will be updated periodically as more information becomes available, adding millions of new names with each future volume. #50029, 7 CDs. \$19.

5. The British Vital Records Index contains nearly five million names from parish registers, civil registrations and other record collections in England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland. The records on the index span more than three centuries, from 1538 to 1888. The five CDs in this set concentrate on birth and christening records (4 discs) and also list some marriages (1 disc). The amount of accessible data can vary greatly from parish to parish. This vital records index will be an ongoing project, which will also be updated periodically. #50028, 5 CDs, \$15.

The Family History Department expects to begin releasing the 1880 U.S. Census and the 1881 British Census in early 1999.

SHERIFF'S DAILY LOG by Maurice Helterline

Perhaps there is one source of genealogical information that some of us have overlooked. It is the Sheriff's Daily Log as it relates to such things as traffic accidents, thefts, assaults, suicides, murders, etc.

There is one instance that I have in mind. It is the death (suicide) of Michael Flahive, which occurred 5 July 1892. His name was mentioned in the pages of the *Missoulian* of 1888 and 1889. Also, in the Land Office decision in 1906 (article in the *Plainsman* that year) of Ed Love vs, Annie Flahive, widow of Michael Flahive, the decision was made in favor of Flahive. However, the Missoula County death records begin too late (1895) to include Michael Flahive's death.

While I was at the graduate library at the University of Washington in Seattle looking up information from the newspapers on microfilm there, I saw that included in the stacks was an Index to the *Spoksman Review* from the 1880's to 1920. This index covered many categories, including deaths in Western Montana. In going through the death index, the name of Michael Flahive jumped out and grabbed my attention. So I went to the date listed

(Spoksman Review, 9 July 1892) and found a single paragraph on the death of Michael Flahive. That paragraph went like this:

"Horse Plains; July 7 [1892], Michael Flahive was found dead [on July 5.] Coroner's jury reached a verdict of suicide."

That was about all that the paragraph said, but that was enough, and then some. My thinking is that since a coroner's jury was picked and a verdict reached, this verdict should be in the Missoula County Coroner's Daily Log and Reports, if such records could be found. Also, probably in the Missoula County Sheriff's Daily Log, if such records still exist, for the week of July 5-7, 1892.

GENEALOGY AND SPAM' WARNING!

I recently received this notice from W. David Samuelsen, listowner Alsace-Lorraine-L He says " .this was forwarded to me for further distribution to your attention. I added the [comments] for your better information."

[Deceptive] Genealogy Web Site Sells Your Name and E-mail Address

It's a tough world. Lots of businesses sell their customer lists these days. The result is that you get junk mail and marketing phone calls from all sorts of companies trying to sell you something you probably don't want. The newest twist is "spam mail", unwanted e-mails that advertise all sorts of junk. Now a well-known genealogy Web site is contributing to the spam mail that you receive and apparently is profiting from personal information that they obtain from you under the guise of helping you do genealogy research. In fact, the Web site apparently is a "front", as the main purpose seems to be gathering personal information about you and then selling that information. The file they sell reportedly contains information about each person's date of birth, gender, email address, state and ZIP code. The Web advertisement says that the file contains listings for 33,600 people who have left personal information on the Family Tree House site.

The Family Tree House Web site at http://www.usaafter.com claims that it is "the Association for FamilyTree Enrollment and Registry." The home page says, "This site offers free family tree software and links to key genealogy sites. The software is available online. You can build your FamilyTree House (continued on pg. 8)

STUMPTOWN HISTORICAL SOCIETY FAMILY HISTORY PROJECT

While passing time in Whitefish this summer awaiting a Missoula Mavericks baseball, my husband and I visited the Stumptown Historical Society, located in the Whitefish Railroad Depot. Their address is 500 Depot Street, Suite 101, Whitefish, Montana 59937-2567 (406-862-0067.) They have a very nice museum with a collection of artifacts from the local area. However, as family historian Mary Harris so kindly showed us, they also have quite a collection of local railroad records and family histories. The railroad records are not indexed and need to be searched on-site. The Family History Projects (histories of Whitefish area families) are contained in three-ring binders in alphabetical order. As Mary pointed out these family histories may not contain very much actual genealogical material, but are more family stories

and anecdotes. Just the sort of thing we're always trying to find! Mary Harris compiled the following list of surnames in the Family History Projects.

SPAM...(continued from pg. 7.) in real time, no downloading is required." They also say, "you can create and register your own on-line FamilyTree. And because it is on-line, you can enlist the help of other family members by giving them your personal access code to allow them to fill in the missing branches--it's a project the whole family can participate in no matter where they live." On another page the site advises, "When requesting information, please make sure you include your name, mailing address and the information you would like. "After they collect all the personal information from you and your other family members, the owners of Family Tree House apparently package the information and sell it to other companies that send junk mail or spam e-mails. On a different Web site, the owners of Family Tree House offer "a file of 33,600 last-12-month registrants of the Family Tree House, an association that offers Web site members free software and links to genealogy sites. "The file they sell

[Dr. Brian Leverich's (he is the one running the Rootsweb.com) response] This isn't the first time this has happened. GeoCities has been cheerfully selling its information about its members to whoever wanted to buy it for as long as I can remember. They were sufficiently blatant about it that the FTC finally sat on them just a few months ago. Most of the other "free" sites probably do the same thing. The thing that really worries me is the feeling that the information we gather with our query systems and such at sites like GeoCities will eventually be sold to marketeers. I don't think it's a matter of "if" — I think it's a matter of "when". The Board and the SCs probably ought to be thinking about how they are going to regain the confidence of the community after some site like GeoCities sells some business like Broderbund a list of e-mail addresses that appear on genealogical Websites they host. At risk of patting ourselves on the back, this is one problem will never arise at RootsWeb. First of all, we think this is a *really* slimy practice and can't imagine anyone with more moral fiber than an earthworm selling information to marketeers. Apart from that, we couldn't sell information even if we were slimy devils; RootsWeb is funded by voluntary contributions, and those contributions would dry up in a heartbeat and we'd die eventually if we were ever anything other than squeaky-clean in the way we operate.
