Records are from 1866-1929; some are indexes only and others have Record numbers and dates. Records from 1939-1941 will be added to the master index.

"the LDS Church is digitizing their records in its own Granite Vault...Indexing them is in progress....At our May 19th, 2007 PAF meeting Richard Davis presented a program on what's happening as technology digitizes the entire collection of more than 2.3 million rolls of microfilm. (This is estimated as taking 6 years.) The old Family Search will be kept and a 2nd site will begin called, "New Family Search" (NFS). After a couple of years of testing using LDS member records to get all the "bugs" out, this new system will become available to others. You can choose to put your data on-line ...Living persons' records will be excised. To get ready you'll need to scan your documents and put them in Resources in your PAF program ...When fullu functional, any researcher will be able to pull up your document and see what your document says."

About U.S. County Land Ownership Atlases, c. 1864-1918

This database contains approximately 1,200 U. S. county land ownership atlases from the Library of Congress' Geography and Maps division, covering the approximate years 1864-1918. Some photos of county officers, land owners, and buildings or homes are also included.

The Canadian County Atlas Digital Project http://digital.library.mcgill.ca/countyatlas/ projectoverview.html

Begun in July 1998, the County Atlas pilot project initially encompassed ten atlases. Two subsequent Phases allowed the completion of the Ontario map, ultimately totaling forty-three atlases. The County Atlas Digital Project is a searchable database of the property owners' names which appear on the township maps in the county atlases. Township maps, portraits and properties have been scanned, with links from the property owners' names in the database. (Covers Canadian Maritime Provinces, Ontario, and Quebec only) The database is searchable by county and by land owner's surname.

DCP Order Form. The form has been created to provide users with convenient access to high-resolution reproductions of many of our online images. For a small fee, the order form allows interested users the opportunity to obtain high-resolution copies of all maps and pic(Continued from page 3)

September 2007 . "Stars and Bars: A Civil War Research Project" looks for answers to a Confederate Family query; "An Interview With David Allen Lambert" the NEHGS' "Online Genealogist." He assists members with research suggestions via e-mail (or phone) but this is not the same as the NEHGS Research Service which

conducts research for a fee. The NEHGS eNews features a question sent to the Online Genealogist along with his comprehensive reply. [See Bits & Bytes for NEHGS eNews http address.] "Top Tech Toys For Genealogists" is great if you need some info on some really neat, helpful gadgets for genealogy. Also, don't miss "Getting The Most Out Of Google's Tools", "Online Local Histories: Family History At Your Fingertips," and "Unexpected Bonuses in Online Newspapers."

NGS NEWSMAGAZINE July/Sept 2007. See "Where to Start When You Inherit Genealogy," and "Rollin' Down the River" and "Navigating the World of US River-Map Research" for info on how your ancestors may have used our inland waterways for transportation in search of new lands. "Canadian Border Immigration Records, 1895-1950's" - Part 1 introduces the US records that document US— Canada land border crossings. Part 2 (to come) will will examine the process by which the records were created and work through some case studies.

NGS QUARTERLY, June 2007. "Using Cluster Methodology to Backtrack an Ancestor..." will show how broadening your research to include a 'cluster' of migrating families can lead to convincing evidence of birthplace and parents.
