## The National Archives of Ireland: 1911 Census

The returns for 1901 and 1911 are arranged by townland (the smallest division of land) or, in urban areas, by street. The 1901 census lists, for every member of each household; name, age, sex, relationship to head of the household, religion, occupation, marital status and county or country of birth. The census also records an individual's ability to read or write and ability to speak the Irish language. All of this information is given on Form A of the census, which was filled in and signed by the head of each household. Where the head of the household could not write, his or her mark, usually an X, was recorded and witnessed by the enumerator. The same information was recorded in the 1911 census, with one significant addition: married women were required to state the number of years they had been married, the number of their children born alive and the number still living. [They talk about the complete 1901 Irish Census on this web site, but there is no indication of its availability online.]

credit the original contributor or source. I have come across information in several online databases that I know could only have come from my database, only to find that my name and contact information are not included as a source. If you want to include information from others in your database, do contact that person to ask permission—you may even find that they have other information not included in their original database.

It is often hard to correct information in online databases. If you find errors and there is contact information for the submitter do take the time to offer your corrections so as to try to prevent the spread of miss-information which is all too easy these days.

If you have used the **census records on Ancestry.com** recently you will have noticed a new feature in the census databases. They now appear in a split window with the original census page on top, and an every name transcription below. The transcription area allows you to make correction in any of the fields.

database was activated February 22, 2005. This will make all original registrations available for viewing by the general public, as well as allowing for new registrations to be entered through their online program.

There are two sections/areas in the online program:

- Public Area (for viewing/searching only)
- Submitter Area (for those with approved accounts and allowed to enter registrations)

You can enter just a state/city to see a list of all recorded Union Veterans buried in that location. There are 42 Union Veterans listed for Missoula, Montana. Clicking on a name will bring up the veterans known information—name, unit, cemetery, death date, whether or not there is a military headstone and if it is in need of repair, etc...

### GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC / GAR RECORDS

The GAR or Grand Army of the Republic was begun in I866 by Union Veterans of the Civil War. More than 8,600 community-level Posts of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) have been documented to date and that information is accessible through a map link on the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War page at: http://www.suvcw.org/garposts/index.htm. ## Ancestry.com

Ancestry.com has recently added 'Enhanced Image Pages' to almost all of its Census Databases. These new image pages offer split screens with the actual census image on top, and a transcription of the page below. The response to this new format has been varied. Some people like it, others don't. It doesn't work on a Mac! Some say it doesn't work with IE8, or have trouble saving or printing the census images. I had the later problem with IE8, but it went away after I deleted the old version of a 'virtual credit card number generator' program (ucs.exe) from Citi Bank (also use by other banks) and installed the new version which is compatible with IE8. One good feature of the enhances image pages is that you can guickly make corrections to any field in the transcribed image. If you really don't like it, or want to see a larger view of the original census image, you just click the double arrows at the bottom and the right side of the census image, and the census image will be full screen.

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Ancestry has pulled the historic Drouin Collection, which contains Quebec records spanning 346 years from 1621 to 1967. A judge sided with the Drouin Institute, which owns the records, and claimed that Ancestry had not fulfilled its contractual obligation to fully and properly index the collection. Ancestry was granted 60 days (from Aug. 12th) to remedy the situation, but it remains to be seen if they can reindex 55 million names in that time. Not only has Ancestry removed access to the Drouin Collection from its website, but it has removed documents from this collection that Ancestry. com members had saved to their shoeboxes and online family trees. This has infuriated many who paid to access these records and spent many hours researching only to have these records removed from their files. They have no recourse, but the lesson here is AL-WAYS save documents to YOUR computer and make a backup or printed copy.
