Program: Our speaker, Nancy Luger, is a physical anthropologist with a Masters Degree in Forensic Anthropology. Currently she is pursuing acceptance in a PhD program at MSU in American Studies concentrating on "Death and Subsistence Patterns of the Early American Northwest Frontiers". The program presented November 10th will cover the forensic case involving two skeletons whose identities remained a mystery for 35 years and were then reex-

cal analysis. Methods for estimating sex, age at death, ancestry, stature, and pathology/ trauma methods were applied in an effort to glean more information about the remains. Papers of the War Department 1784-1800 Fire destroyed the office of the War Department and all its files in 1800, and for decades historians believed that the collection, and the window it provided into the workings of the early federal government, was lost forever. Thanks to a decade-long effort to retrieve copies of the files scattered in archives across the country, the collection has been reconstituted and is offered here as a fully-searchable digital database. Footnote.com—announced this week that it will be adding the entire US Census Collection to its site. Currently they have the 1860 and 1930 census every name indexes and images. New census records will be added as states are completed and will be interactive in that you will be able to add comments, corrections and even pictures to the census records. Visit http://www.footnote.com/census/ to see how the census on Footnote.com can truly be an interactive experience. You can also sign up to be notified via e-mail when new census records are added to the site.

Footnote.com also has one of the best collections of City Directories on the web. Featuring over 2 million pages, the City Directories Collection on Footnote.com has records dating back to 1785.

Historic Map Works Library Edition—they have some good land ownership atlases here. Map times range from about 1870's to nearly present day. There are also some Directories here.

logical Proof Standard, Building a Solid Case (CR Publications, 2005, 2nd edition) is available at the Missoula Public Library. In this book she shows us that even if we cannot resolve many of our questions beyond a reasonable doubt, "adherence to the Genealogical Proof Standard (GPS) will assure that we have subjected our conclusions to sufficient rigidity and objectivity to present a solid case." She also discusses three classes of evidence now used:

- · Direct or Indirect evidence
- · Original or Derivative source
- · Primary or Secondary information

This differs from the pre-1997 standard which only used the first and third classes of information listed above. The addition of the second class of records helps to differentiate sources that are **comprised of** the originals and those that are **derived from** the originals (i.e. Internet copies of originals) and are more likely to contain errors. Chapter 3. *Evaluating Records*, shows how to evaluate various types of records (Census, Tombstone, Military, Death, Marriage, Birth, Internet, and Compiled Family Histories) using the

#### Why did you start doing genealogy and how many years have you been doing it? (Replies to questionnaire sent lst summer)

- Started in the 1980s when I discovered there
  was Doores history in Montana and I still have not
  proven their link to "my" Doores line. Also in
  honor of my Dad
- After my cousin, Donna, died in 1975, there was nobody doing our family history. So in 1978, I picked up essentially where she left off. That was thirty years ago, and I'm still doing it. With information from Leo and Emily Gustin Helterline's Ancestry published in 1964, and many other sources, I brought it up as far as I could. But at that time, nobody had done anything on my mother's (Green) ancestry. More about that later.
- I got interested in Genealogy about 3 years ago when Ancestry.com offered free access to civil war and other military records for Memorial Day. I heard about it on NPR and had a GGgrandfather who lost an arm, shot off by a cannonball at the second battle of Bull Run. I've always wanted to learn more about him, so I got 3 free days of ancestry.com and was hooked. I did not learn much about that GGgrandfather, but learned a whole lot about my father's father. My father's father died when my Dad was 2 yrs and his mother remarried a man that did not allow anyone to talk of the 1st husband. There were other relatives on ancestry that knew quite a bit about this lost family, so that was very fun to find out all this new info.
- I have always been interested in family history, I have been actively doing it for 1.5 years, and since I have all the family photos and memorabilia I feel I need to restore some order to it so what knowledge we do have doesn't get lost. And, in my own mind, I kept thinkin "who were all those Irish ancestors"?
- Received a letter from a man in Baltimore with the same surname asking for information about the family lineage. That's when the bug bit me. I started in earnest in 1999.
- · Maybe 15 years
- Want to know who my ancestors were and all I can learn about them. About 15 years.
- I started doing genealogy about 5 years ago. My
  mother and grandmother died close together and I
  felt like I never really knew either of them, so I
  wanted to get to know them and part of getting to
  know them involved getting to know their parents
  and grandparents...and it just bloomed from there.

- My father's cousin got me interested. After I got copies of much of her research, I started my own about 35 yrs ago.
- I started in 1976 40 plus years. I have always been interested in Family History and just moved over into genealogy.
- My grandmother had me help her do a couple small books with info she had collected - 35 yrs ago
- 12 years. To find out who my family was.
- I inherited a large box of ancestor photos with very few
- names. I got involved in genealogy in order to identify the folks in
- the pictures. I began by scanning in the photos and sending them to
- lots of first and second cousins (referred to me by other cousins . . .
- and there are dozens of cousins in my family).
   Those I sent the
- packets to helped me identify the individuals, and sent stories and
- some additional photos. That led to trying to find more and more
- cousins with photos/stories. To do all of this required some knowledge
- of my family tree. I've been working on this for 6 years.
- Probably about 30 or 35 years ago.
- About 36 years ago
- A friend and I were in the University bookstore and she showed me a book she was hoping to buy. It had old home woven coverlets in it, and one I pointed to and said, "I have one just like that in a box in the garage." She was very excited and wanted to see it right away. We took it out of the box and found a note attached to it telling who had made it. I had always known I wanted to dig into family history, and this was the impetus. My friend wanted to know all about this greatgrandmother of mine, so the research began.
- We started genealogy trying to find my husband's fathers sisters after his father died... At least 40 years!
- An interest in history and family as well as tracking a medical problem that has been in the family for a long time.
- I was interested in the history of my family. I did it steady for 6 or 7 years and have not worked on it much lately.
