PROGRAM: "Irish Studies: Past and Present"

Dr Bernadette Sweeney will give a presentation on The Gathering: Collected Oral Histories of the Irish in Montana and will also introduce some of her other work with the University of Montana, as a professor of Irish Drama with the Irish Studies Program. Although not a genealogist herself, Sweeney will also talk on undertaking such research in Ireland, describing some of the potential pitfalls and possibilities.

The Gathering: Collected Oral Histories of the Irish in Montana' is a long-term interdisciplinary oral history project which seeks to record and to archive the Irish and Irish-American folk histories, performances, practices, and traditions. In part, the impetus for this project comes out of a visit in 2008 by pre-eminent scholar of the Irish lament or Caoineadh tradition, Professor Seán Ó Coileán. After Professor Ó Coileán's lecture on the lament tradition, in which he made clear the historical disappearance of the Caoineadh in Ireland, a number of Butte and Anaconda elders came down to talk to him. These living repositories of the memory of Irish and Irish-American tradition explained to Professor Ó Coileán that the Caoineadh tradition lived on in Montana and that they, themselves, had witnessed the very traditions that O Coileán knew to have vanished in Ireland. This project will record and build on traditions and connections that are currently in danger of being lost. The Gathering will do much to raise the profile of the Irish community in Montana, through its links to the Irish Studies program and the wider academic community at University of Montana. It will also further the University's partnership with University College Cork through research, and will further connections between the University of Montana and the wider community.

Sweeney is a native of Ireland and married to Butte-Irishman Bryan Ferriter. She studied at the University of Ulster and Trinity College Dublin. She has worked as professor of drama and theatre at University College Cork since 2002, and as adjunct faculty with the University of Montana since 2009. She is the Research Director of The Gathering: Collected Oral Histories of the Irish in Montana.

Ancestry.com announced online versions of The Source: A Guidebook to American Genealogy and Red Book: American State, County and Town Sources are now available for free in a wiki format. The online editions are the latest versions of those books, and the new online versions are searchable by every word. These 'wiki' versions will allow users to update, expand on and even add to information (pending review.)

Genealogy Question #5

What is the best organizational tip or hint that you've been given or discovered?

- I think that it is very important to have printouts of each document. You never know what else is going to be important, so if you only take notes from the document you may not include info that could be useful at a later date.
- How to write dates consistently and to use the maiden name of women
- · Don't let your filing go so long as I do.....
- Keep everything no matter how insignificant... you might need it.
- Organize by dates
- Googlebooks.com has millions of old books scanned available for free online. Books that I have had difficulty accessing I can now find at 3am and use them for as long as I want. There is a search tool and you can type in a name, area, or event and read full books. The books are scanned, not transcribed. Great Resource!!!
- · "Have a plan"....but I don't follow that advice.
- · Don't take yourself too seriously.
- Keep struggling to maintain a chosen organizational system, even though it is difficult to keep up to date!
- Searching GOOGLE has been a tremendous help, and then to be able to cross reference my info from all sources. On my mother's (Green) side, just hearing her talk about family in Ashland, Wisconsin was a big help. But she was not able to write it down. In October, 1989, I had enough money to make the trip from Missoula to Ashland to research her ancestry. The trip was very worthwhile.
- Start binders and keep each family separate or at least get enough smaller file drawers - one for each family.
- Get a computer program!
- Cite your sources! Nothing is more important.

- Family Tree Maker computer program. "The Complete Idiot's Guide to Genealogy" by Christine Rose and Kay Germain Ingalls.


