### **ANCESTRY.com News**

#### US Naturalization Record Indexes 1791-1992

From Ancestry.com

"Contained in this database are indexes to naturalization records (primarily declarations and petitions) for various courts (predominantly U.S. District and Circuit courts) and years. The states whose records are currently included in the database are Alaska, California, Connecticut, Hawaii, Illinois, Louisiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Montana, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, New York, Tennessee, Washington, and Vermont. The records are either sheets containing lists of names or individual index cards. Some records summarize a large part of genealogical information and others have no introduction, but start directly with the index cards.

Because this database only contains indexes, you will need to order a copy of the original paperwork from the National Archives. The regional offices of the National Archives most often are the repository where the records are now located. In some cases the original records may be available on microfilm at the Archives in Washington, D.C."

[Montana does not appear in the list of states available in the drop-down list but you can enter "Montana" as a keyword and find naturalizations in the Montana District Court. See below for ordering copies of the original Montana records. Ed.]
