

He is the author of three books: *Garden in the Grasslands* (1969), *The Butte Irish* (1989) and *Beyond the American Pale* (2010).

Hundreds of Thousands May Lose Internet Access in July

Is your computer running slower and slower? Has your antivirus software been disabled? If so, your system is probably infected with an online advertising scam called DNS Changer and may lose its ability to connect to the Internet on July 9.

Luckily, there is an easy way to determine if your system has been infected: the FBI is encouraging users to visit a website run by its security partner, www.dcwg.org, that will inform them whether their computer is infected and explain how to fix the problem.

If your system is infected and if you procrastinate until July 9 or after, you won't be able to connect to the Internet and therefore won't be able to run the online test. The time to test is NOW.

Film Ordering Is Now Done Online, at Home Librarians at the local Family History Centers can no longer order/renew microfilm/fiche for you. This must now be done online at home or via a computer at the Family History Center if you do not have access to the Internet at home. You can log in/ create an account at : <https://www.familysearch.org/films/> to take a look at the new system. *****Price increase , \$7.50 for films and \$4.75 for fiche.** You can pay by credit card or PayPal. **Note:** Before ordering any film, check to make sure the Family History Library Catalog does not have a digital copy online. Also, the local Family History Libraries have conducted a survey of all microfilms at the local FHL and these are available online to prevent ordering of duplicate films—when you enter the film/fiche number that you want to order, it will tell you if the item is already at the FHL you are using. The films/fiche will be sent to your local Family History Library for viewing and will remain in the library as usual. All renewals are also done online.

Step-by-Step Guide to Family Research at the National Archives

WASHINGTON, April 18, 2012 /PRNewswire-USNewswire/ -- The Foundation for the National Archives announces the publication of the *Genealogy Tool Kit: Getting Started on Your Family History at the National Archives*, written by National Archives genealogy archives specialist John P. Deeben.

This 160-page step-by-step guide was published by the Foundation and launched in April 2012 to coincide with the celebration of the National Archives' release of the 1940 U.S. Census. The Foundation has long supported research at the National Archives, including its annual support of the Archives' Genealogy Fair, and the development of genealogy products such as this *Tool Kit* and other archival and research-oriented items.

The *Genealogy Tool Kit* will help family researchers of all levels of experience to explore how their ancestors interacted with the Federal Government over the course of their lives. Did they enter the United States from a foreign country? Apply to become an American citizen? Enlist in a regiment during a particular war? File for a patent, homestead, or pension?

Through such questions, and many more, the *Genealogy Tool Kit* helps genealogists to navigate the records at the National Archives, from census and naturalization records to military and federal land grant records. With checklists to track the readers' progress, family trees to fill in as ancestors are discovered, and room for taking notes, the *Tool Kit* will also serve as researchers' own record of their family history research project.

The *Genealogy Tool Kit* also includes the personal discovery stories of Archivist of the United States David S. Ferriero, documentary filmmaker Ken Burns, and author and journalist A'Lelia Bundles, as well as inspirational accounts from several other family histo-

rians.



Direct ME NYC 1940—Use Old Phone Bpks to Unlock the Federal Census

The New York Public Library digitized the 1940 New York City phone books and created a tool that allows users to move from the phone book listings to the 1940 census schedules on NARA's website. When a person of interest is selected from the telephone book, the address will be mapped on both a ca. 1940 map and a 2012 map. The relevant enumeration district(s) will appear, and entering the name of a cross street will further refine the results. In some cases it may be impossible to narrow the results to one ED; for instance, if a street is on the border of two EDs, you will see two EDs for that street. Click on a borough (Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens, Manhattan, Staten Island) to bring up the 1940 phone directory for that borough. You can look through the pages alphabetically, or select a starting letter from the A-Z directory. Use the zoom tool in lower left corner to enlarge and select names. Clicking a name brings up a small map showing the cross streets. And a number of Enumeration District numbers. Narrow the list of ED's list by continuing to select cross streets if possible. You can then find the actual 1940 census records at : <http://1040census.archives.gov/> or on ancestry. [I found navigation with the arrows on this site to be awkward and you have to keep trying to get the arrows in the right places.] Sample below.
