


The Mansfield Library at the University of Montana has many publications which can be extremely valuable in searching for one's ancestors. The Card Catalog located on the ground level (3) is the index to the Library's holdings. The majority of the publications housed in the Library are indexed by author, by subject, and by title. The major publications not indexed in the card catalog are publications issued by the U.S. government and the map collection. Both of the latter have their own indexes which are located on level one of the Library.

Sometimes one can locate information by just browsing through the shelves if the arrangement of the books is understood. The Library is arranged by subject divisions: Science, Social Science, Humanities, Documents, Archives and Special Collections. Most of the genealogical materials in the Library are found in the Social Science collection on level two, the Documents collection and the Archives and Special Collections on level one, and the Reference Collection on level three.

The books in the Mansfield Library are arranged by the Dewey Decimal Classification System, where numbers are assigned to books by subject areas.

929.1 X A512 THE AMERICAN GENEALOGICAL-BIOGRAPHICAL INDEX TO AMER-ICAN GENEALOGICAL, BIOGRAPHICAL AND LOCAL HISTORY MATERIALS

This index is published by the Godfrey Memorial Library in Middletown, Connecticut. It is shelved in Level Two in the Social Science Division. The series is in the process of being published and about four volumes are published each year. The University Library does not have vols. 1 through 5. Its first volume is no. 6 and contains the surnames AVES and the last volume received is vol. 115 which contains the surname MEDBURY, Stephen.

The publishers say that the series "offers a very easy way to find out something about the lives of any American man or woman to whom no clue can be found in any other source. We estimate that "Series Two" of the Index will, when it is completed, contain references of some sort to over twelve million such otherwise untraceable Americans."

"In the case of genealogy we would state its function in these terms: it should be the first tool to be used by every genealogical researcher in seeking an answer for every question. In the long run, this use of it will save him (or her) time and trouble."

Some of the major titles indexed in this series are as follows:

- 1. 1790 HEADS OF FAMILIES CENSUS
- 43 volumes of records of soldiers who served in the Revolutionary War.
- 3. Over 200 printed town and family genealogies which were either not indexed or only partially indexed.
- 4. The BOSTON EVENING TRANSCRIPT "Genealogical Column" which was published over 40 years and contains approximately 2 million personal name references never before indexed. "This TRANSCRIPT material relates mainly to the inhabitants of New England during the 17th and 18th centuries; and it covers them as no other single publication begins to cover them."

- 5. Published church and town vital records including cemetery records.
- 6. Marriage and Revolutionary War records from the <u>Pennsylvania</u> <u>Archives</u>.

Notice in part 6, the bibliographic citations are highly abbreviated. In order to determine the correct citation, one must go to the "Bibliography of sources indexed" which appears in the following volumes:

The reference to Stanley A. McKay appears on p. 353 of this book.

Since the Mansfield Library contains only a few published family histories, it would be necessary to determine what library would contain that book in its collection. Most libraries will not circulate family histories but many will photocopy information when exact page nos. are known.

The Genealogical Society Library in Salt Lake City has probably the best collection of family and local histories in the Western United States. These are listed on the "Microfilmed Card Catalog" under locality or under surname. The Library will photocopy pages out of their books or microfilms for a nominal charge with a minimum charge of \$1.00. To use this service it is necessary to obtain a "Photoduplication Order" from which is available without cost from the Branch Genealogical Library. Since the "Microfilmed Card Catalog" is quite out of date, many more volumes of family histories actually appear in the Library's holdings. By filling out a "Reference Questionnaire" it is possible to determine if a given publication is in the Library when it does not appear on the M.C.C. Film copies of actual family histories can be borrowed through

Film copies of actual family histories can be borrowed through the Branch Genealogical Libraries. Photocopies of specific pages can be ordered directly by the patron.

The Genealogical column of the BOSTON TRANSCRIPT from 1900-1941 is available on microfilm through the Branch Genealogical Library.

The publishers state that this is the greatest single source of material for genealogical data for the New England area and for the period of 1600-1800.

Others with genealogical and local history expertise will share this column with me. Polly Haffey, one of our society members, had an interesting genealogical experience this past quarter and I have asked her to write about it for you to give you some idea of the types of things which often end up as part of archival collections. During the winter quarter of 1981 I took a class at the University of Montana called Archival Management. Each member of the class was responsible for sorting and properly filing a small collection. The collection I was given to process was a genealogical collection of Mrs. Fra (Edwin) Dana. Mr. Dana was a rancher in Parkman, Wyoming, with a second ranch in Cascade County, Montana. Mrs. Dana was a painter and avid genealogist. Some of her collection did not pertain to genalogy but contained topics of interest to her: World War I letters and papers, astrological magazines, and accounts of early travels or early history of the U.S. The major portion of the collection, however, is genealogical information about either her family or her husband's family.

Mrs Dana did considerable research on many of her main family lines. There is a folder on each of the following: Anderson, Andrew, Andrews, Brewster, Broadwell, Chappel, Dana, Deacon, Dinwiddie, Dunn, Dunster, Forester, Foster, Hathorne, Jackson, Lawrence, Maxwell, Morse, Page, Paine, Peabody (Paybody), Porter, Putnam, Sunderland, and VerPlanck.

Mrs Dana was from Rockville, Indiana. Many of her ancestors arrived in the New England states, particularly Massachusetts, from England. Some were from Scotland or France and VerPlanck was from Holland.

I have listed the main family lines. These are certainly not the only surnames she mentions. Many names are in more than one line through intermarriage. When she was able to find information about the individual, Mrs. Dana often wrote a very short biography about him/her. She also kept correspondence about her research. On the margins of the sheets, she has often written the sources of her information. Her letters indicate that considerable research was done by a professional genealogist. These folders may contain only one or two handwritten pages or, as in the Maxwell folder, as many as 30 or 40. They are all handwritten. Some lines date to pre-Revolutionary War times in this country and to King Richard the Lion Hearted in England and King Louis XXIII in France.

Several books or pamphlets are filed in this collection. They are:

The first pamphlet contains pictures as well as a short paragraph about the house or building. The second is a list of buildings and houses and the town in which they are located.

Address before the Essex Bar Association Dec. 8, 1885. By

William D. Northend. Printed at the Salem Press, Salem, (Mass.), in 1885. (From the Historical Collections of the Essex Institute, vol. 22).

In addition to the address, there is a list of members of the bar, some from prior to 1770 until 1885.

<u>The Part Taken by Essex County in the Organization and Settle-</u> <u>ment of the Northwest Territory.</u> Printed at the Salem Press, Salem, (Mass.), 1885. (From the Historical Collections of the Essex Institute, vol. 25, 1888). Not indexed.

Paine Family Records. Edited by N.D. Paine, M.D., 26 W. 30th St., New York, N.Y. Vol. 1-2. This has two indexes for each volume: a general one as a table of contents and an index of Christian names, to inter-

marriages, and names incidentally mentioned.

The Washington Manor House. By Ethel Armes. Published by the Sulgrave Institution, 1922.

This is a description of the home of George Washington's ancestors in Northamptonshire, England. In addition, it has a list of the patron and founder members of the Sulgrave Institution.

Record of the Parish List of Deaths 1785-1819. By Rev. William Bentley, D.D., Pastor of the East Church, Salem. Printed for the Essex Institute, Salem, 1882. (From Historical Collecions of the Essex Institute.)

Reprint from an unknown book on the Dana family.

This small collection contains a wealth of information. It is not indexed. Dr. Johnson keeps a folder on each collection in the archives. In the Fra Dana folder are notes that I made as I processed the collection. I listed the surnames as on a family group sheet so that I could see the relationships of the surnames. This folder is kept in Dr. Johnson's work room.

The name of the collection is "Fra Dana Papers," collection number 96. There are two boxes in this collection and any of these papers may be xeroxed.

PLAINS, MONTANA, 1895

This village, formerly known as Horse Plains, is situated on the main line of the Northern Pacific railway, 76 miles west of Missoula and 180 miles east of Spokane. It is located in a beautiful valley, which is surrounded on all sides by sky-piercing spurs which go to form the majestic Bitterroot range of mountains, and for which this valley forms its basin.

The plain is an exceedingly attractive one, watered by the Clark Fork river and several creeks, and of its fertile soil, over 10,000 acres are now under cultivation and producing higher grades of hay, grain, fruits, and vegetables. The adjoining mountains are rich in minerals. The bottom lands are luxuriantly carpeted with grass and the hills furnish the finest kind of timber in unlimited quantities. The climate is superb, excessive heat or cold unknown.

Not far from town are some remarkably efficacious hot springs, owned by M. E. Quinn, which have effected surprising cures in rheumatic and kidney diseases, and are fast becoming a popular summer and winter resort.

The proximity of Plains to the Bitterroot and Camas mining sections makes it a point emminently fitted for the distribution of supplies of every kind, any of which can be purchased as cheaply of our merchants as in any larger city. The expected opening of the Flathead reservation, upon which this town borders, will prove an added and permanent support for this already thriving place.

Plains is beautifully located on a perfectly level site, and displays a credible array of modern architecture in wood, brick, and stone - two fine hotels, several stores, wagon and sleigh factory, blacksmith shops, school house and churches, two fine public halls, grain warehouses, barber, tailor and shoe shops, a large railroad yard and stock pens, a neat depot, and a complete system of waterworks. New building are constantly going up, and there is not, and has not been for months, an idle mechanic or laborer in town.
