Beyond Land Acknowledgments: the Library Foundation Supports Festival of Indigenous Culture & Creativity

IndigiPalooza, Missoula's inaugural celebration of Indigenous literature, art, and culture, was a fantastic success — thanks to a hardworking collaboration between Chris LaTray (Little Shell Chippewa), Chicka-

dee Community Services, and Missoula Public Library; and to financial support from the Library Foundation and others. More than 300 people attended the August 1 gala reading featuring former US Poet Laureate Joy

Harjo (Mvskogee/Creek), and each Library session on August 2 drew an average of 160 attendees. Topics included entrepreneurship, cultural appropriation, language preservation, oral traditions, and resilience. MPL's social media post of Apsaalooke hip hop artist Supaman garnered 16,700 views and more than 800 reactions!

Presenters represented a diversity of backgrounds: Blackfeet/Pikuni, Salish, Apsaalooke, Dakota, Upper

Skagit, Nooksa, Lumbee, Little Shell and Turtle Mountain Chippewa, and Cherokee. Coorganizing IndigiPalooza complements MPL's goal to ensure the Library belongs to everyone and is filled with rich cultural connections. The Library Foundation is honored to channel the giving that will help make a community-wide endeavor like IndigiPalooza possible. \Box

On the Road with Dory! A Bookmobile Q+A

Q: The Library's donor-powered bookmobile has been on the road for one year. Can you describe the impact in a few statistics?

A: We've put on 5100 miles, served 4000 patrons, circulated 1800 items, distributed 700 free books. More than 200 visitors have signed up for their first library card at the bookmobile!

Q: Out of 26 unique stops on the book-mobile route, do you have any personal favorites?

A: I genuinely enjoy them all. I love visiting senior living facilities, and doing art and science with the kids at our neighborhood stops is the best. Getting to visit with folks of all ages in their own spaces is a dynamic kind of work. Lately, I 've especially enjoyed our stop at the Clinton Food Pantry.

Q: What's an unforgettable book you've read?

A: I can't stop thinking about Hidden Valley Road by Robert Kolker (616.898).

MPL's Sprinter bookmobile, the purchase of which was 100% funded through donations and grants, has been expanding library services to Missoula County's rural and less-mobile neighbors since October 2024. Kudos to Dory Athey, MPL's Community Engagement team, library director Slaven Lee, and our incredible donor universe for making this form of equity and inclusivity a high priority. \Box



Reimagining the Public Library Space: A Green Light for a Green Roofscape!

As of September, final funding commitments for living rooftops and a climate resilience learning hub at our favorite Library have been secured! Missoula Public Library Foundation led the charge with an early pledge



of \$70,000 over two years. Similar matching funds have since been pledged by the Missoula Redevelopment Agency and Missoula County. Together, these commitments unlock EPA funding, which will be administered by the Western Montana Conservation Commission. Initially, MT DNRC planned to contribute matching funds. But despite receiving a high rating from conservation experts, House Appropriations inexplicably cut Missoula's project from DNRC's budget in the last legislature. Thanks to the persistence of Tracy Campbell at Missoula Stormwater, the project remains on track! When complete, MPL's green roofscape will help protect Missoula's watershed, reduce heat island effect, and increase carbon sink capacity and pollinator habitat. Green space will also serve as an interactive demonstration model for regenerative design and urban ecology. A green roofscape continues the Library's legacy of awardwinning sustainability in design and programming, which was recognized last year by the International Federation of Library Associations in Barcelona.
